
brighter future. We in Southampton County Public Schools are excited to be a part of these adventures.


Flu viruses pass from person to person through coughing or sneezing by people with the flu.

- If you suspect that you or your child is getting the flu, stay home to avoid contact with others so that the virus does not
- Plan now for your child's care if you or he/she become ill. If this happens, you or your child may be asked to stay home from work or school for at least 24 hours after you are without a fe-

ver without the use of feverreducing medicine.

- Be sure to have a family plan that includes having adequate food and supplies on hand to decrease your need to be out in public.
- If symptoms worsen or cause you concern, contact your doctor's office by telephone for advice before arriving there in person.
